

Meanwhile, the Tsuchiura committee is preparing to welcome this year's exchange students when they arrive in the next




few days. We are all invited to join in the welcoming picnic at Mitchell Park on March 15 (12:45 p.m. in the Pine Grove Area.

We have not yet received further word from Pabbles Dolina regarding status of the Library. We hope that it might be used for a community center until the time comes for retooling the library.

Pictures and Description of Conditions in Palo by Dr. Enoch Choi

At our last Board meeting Dr. Enoch Choi of the PAMF showed us a stunning video of Palo and environs. We saw the Cathedral which has served as a morgue, refuge and spiritual center for the citizens of Palo. Prior to leaving for the Philippines, Dr. Choi and fellow volunteers, including N.A. members helped pack medical supplies which they took there. Dr. Choi was able to enter the Children's Library through the kitchen door and could assess the damage to books and other equipment. Looters had stolen some computers and other items after the storm.

Encouraging News from the Philippines

On Saturday January 25 the Philippine government and the country's largest Muslim insurgency group negotiated the final details of a peace accord. It is hoped that this may end 40 years of violence that has killed tens of thousands of people. According to the accord, an autonomous Muslim-dominated region will be created in the south {Mindinao} in a predominately Christian nation. However several groups have refused to join the accord so much remains to be done to insure peace. Teresita Quintos Delos, Presidential adviser on the peace talks said, "In a world looking for peaceful solutions to all troubles, we are grateful that we have found ours." N.Y. Times-Jan.26.

We are exploring multiple exchange possibilities involving Albi and Palo Alto citizens sharing the same passion. Some themes were already very successful in the past, other are new:

Cyclists exchange: multiple successful visits, both ways occurred in the past. The latest was the trip to Albi in 2011 by the Western Wheelers cyclists. It would be time to follow-up on the invitation we extended to the French at the end of the stay and have our Albi friends

• Singers exchange: In the past, Neighbors Abroad initiated an exchange between the Albi Assou-Lezert Chorale and the Palo Alto Aurora Singers Chorale. This was immensely successful and they ended up visiting each other and singing together many times with the

sponsoring of Neighbors Abroad. It now would be time for a visit from the French. Amar Singh, a long time chorister with the Aurora Singers is actively driving this with the strong support of Karen Boyd, Aurora Singers President and Dawn Reyen, Chorale Director. He has contacted Emmanuelle, the Assou-Lezert Chorale Director and there seems to be a good possibility to have them come to Palo Alto in 2015.

We are also exploring some others tracks, such as a possible exchange involving the Rotary Club in Albi and Palo Alto. I will keep you posted in my next articles on the progress on all these fronts.

ENSCHEDE

In December 2013, I received an email from Paul Bijleveld that "Palo Alto and Enschede have agreed to have a joint internship for a Saxion student." Paul gave



the student my email address and in early January 2014, I received an email from Carlijn Soer. Carlijn is the intern from Saxion University in Enschede who will do part of her internship in the city of Palo Alto. She will arrive in Palo Alto on March 5th and depart on

May 29th.

Carlijn is 20 years old and comes from Oldenzaal, a small city in the province of Overijssel that is about 20 minutes from Enschede. Carlijn will spend three months here; I will fetch her from the SFO on March 3rd and she returns to the Netherlands on May 29th. Carlijn is studying Commercial

Economics at Saxion University and will receive a Bachelor of Business Administration when she completes her studies. Her major emphasis is Marketing. While she is in Palo Alto she will work on projects that are involved with start-ups in the hopes of encouraging those companies that are interested, to consider Enschede as a hopping off point to enter the European market.

In her spare time Carlijn enjoys playing field hockey and she volunteers with the LEO Club (Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity) the young Lions in Enschede. As Carlijn wrote, "Enschede has a lot to offer!"

On January 14th I met with Thomas Fehrenbach (Economic Development Manager City of Palo Alto) to talk about any plans the city might have in mind to welcome our first Enschede/Palo Alto intern and how

the cities of Enschede and Palo Alto might endeavor to develop activities/projects to enliven the sister city relationship.

As I have mentioned in previous Enschede reports for El Chisme, in 2007 the cities of Enschede and Palo Alto entered into an Economic Alliance Agreement. As noted in the 2007 memo from Palo Alto city hall the objective of the Economic Alliance Agreement, "... aims to improve quality of life in our cities through economic growth... to invest in its citizens' and their well being and ensure the city's long term fiscal health. The economic partnership agreement aims to benefit the entire region to which our cities belong."

Some examples of the Economic Alliance Agreement between City of Enschede and the city of Palo Alto include:

- Promotion of "business partnerships"
- Organization of "business seminars and workshops at both locations"
- "Support exchange" of "students of universities."

Carlijn is our first student to participate in this unique cooperative Economic Alliance Agreement.

In 2013 representatives from both cities met in Palo Alto and developed Opportunities for Cooperation: "...the topic of sustainable urban mobility and the development of plans and actions to improve the traffic situation in Palo Alto." Actions to "facilitate, persuade and connect" were discussed:

- "Facilitate- the city of Enschede developed a bicycle plan ...aimed to get more people to cycle: a network of connectivity and safety; parking facilities for bicycles; and communication/ marketing" to encourage bicycling.
- "Persuade- "We (Enschede) combine traffic data with a multi-model route planner" to advise people "how to travel to get a personal gain."
- "Connect- Develop attractive, diverse and innovative bicycle hiways between key commercial, industrial and educational sites. The developments can be physical-picnic spaces, technological (wi-fi spots) and beautiful (art displays).

We are looking forward to Carlijn's visit, we wish her success with her internship in Palo Alto and we anticipate innovative developments in Palo Alto to improve the quality of life in our city.

I received an email from Dirk van der Linden that I thought might interest some of our readers:


"About six miles from Maastricht in the Netherlands lie buried 8,301 American soldiers who died in 'Operation Market Garden' in the battles to liberate Holland in the fall and winter of 1944-5. Every one of the men buried in the cemetery, as well as those in the Canadian and British military cemeteries has been adopted by a Dutch family who mind the grave, decorate, and keep alive the memory of the soldier they have adopted. It is even the custom to keep a portrait of 'their' American soldier in a place of honor in their home. Annually on 'Liberation Day' Memorial Services are held for 'the men who died to liberate Holland.' The day concludes with a concert. The final piece is always 'IL Silenzio', a memorial piece commissioned by the Dutch and first played in 1965 on the 20th anniversary of Holland's liberation. It has been the concluding piece of the memorial concert ever since.

This year the soloist was a 13 year old Dutch girl, Melissa Venema, backed by André Rieu and his orchestra (the Royal Orchestra of the Netherlands). This beautiful concert piece is based upon the original version of taps and was composed by Italian composer Nino Rossi."

I would like to introduce myself to you and invite you and your Neighbors Abroad



About myself: I have been a resident of Palo Alto for the past 11 years. I am 50 years old (male), married, with 2 kids. I am very much involved in the city and community through the education system (Fairmeadow, JLS, and Gunn schools), volunteering in schools (JLS chess club for the last 7 years), longtime member of the Palo Alto Run Club, Boy Scouts, and more. I have been involved with City Council activities, taking part in meetings and discussions.

Professionally, I am a Professor at Cogswell College, and have been in various research and management roles in high-tech for all my professional life (most of it in Palo Alto: HP/Agilent Labs, Corning West Technology Center).


On a personal note, I have been to Japan quite a few times in the past, on business and on family travel. I've mainly stayed in Tokyo, Kyoto, and Kamakura, with short day visits to other locations. I have never visited Tsuchiura, and am looking forward to seeing the beautiful city during the Cherry-Blossom season.

About running: As long as I can remember, I always enjoyed hiking, running, backpacking and orienteering. However, it took me almost 40 years to run my first road marathon in 2001. That year, I was introduced to the local community of trail-runners. Enjoying the newfound company, as well as the beauty of the Bay Area, I embarked on ultra-marathon events. From 50k runs, to 50M, and then 100k and 100M. I ran Western States, one of the most well-known 100-mile races in the world, and finished in under 24 hours. This qualified me for the unique silver finisher buckle. I've also run other road marathons, including New York and San Francisco.

In the past 6 years, I haven't run many races, but have been dedicated more to community events, including organizing sport activities for the local scouts, and unique runs for the local running community. The most celebrated of these special runs I have established is our annual (Palo Alto) Bay-to-Breakers. This run starts from Palo Alto Baylands, goes through old Palo Alto historical sites, proceeds through Stanford and Woodside, and ends in Half Moon Bay.
