Ukraine

Neighbors Abroad Continues to Make an Impact in Ukraine

Our [Ukrainian Children's Relief Fund](#) has passed the \$100,000 mark since we started fundraising in the days following Russia's invasion. We are immensely grateful for the generous donations from the Palo Alto community. These funds have been transferred to our partner, [Kleine Herzen](#), a non-profit with operations in Palo Alto's

Sister City Heidelberg, Germany. Kleine Herzen has an excellent track record for helping Ukrainian orphans and has used the funds raised so far to bring close to 200 orphans and their caregivers, along with their families, from war-ravaged parts of Ukraine into Austria. Our continued support of Kleine Herzen's on-the-ground efforts means we also are able to help those children who were not able to flee Ukraine.

Our efforts have caught the attention of the San Francisco Chamber Orchestra, which is now raising money for the Children's Fund and even [played the Ukrainian national anthem](#) during a recent concert.

Oaxaca, Mexico

Delegation Makes Trip to Oaxaca; Supporter Offers to Match Donations

In April, representatives of Neighbors Abroad, the City of Palo Alto and our non-profit partner, Vidas y Sueños, made a long-awaited visit to Oaxaca and surrounding areas.



The group followed up on past projects in our Mexican Sister City, visited organizations that Neighbors Abroad supports, made new connections, and launched the [Art & Sustainability](#) initiative in Yaxe, the indigenous village where the idea for the cross-border art exhibit took root.

The group was treated to a welcome breakfast at [Crecemos](#), a non-profit, supported by Neighbors Abroad that provides educational, music, and sports programs for young people. Dancers from El Centro Calpulli, another youth-focused group Neighbors Abroad has championed, provided entertainment.



At Oaxaca City Hall, the group met with city officials and installed banners featuring the Art & Sustainability artists and their works. Other stops on the busy itinerary included a tour of the mountaintop observatory Palo Alto established for Oaxaca almost 50 years ago, as well as a photo opportunity with a fleet of fire trucks Palo Alto donated to Oaxaca.

A highlight of the trip was the group's return to the village Yaxe, where Neighbors Abroad, in partnership with other nonprofits, [helped install 50 rainwater capture tanks](#) a few years ago. In a region that has little in the way of piped-in water, these

life-changing tanks capture summer rainwater that would otherwise go to waste. The delegation reported that the results have been transformative for the village of 3,000, where residents previously had to rely on small amounts of water they could store themselves. Now they are able to grow additional crops and avoid long trips to a river for drinking and bathing water.

During the trip, an unexpected encounter delighted our VP for Oaxaca, **Sarah Burgess**, who was an exchange student in Oaxaca in 1975. She had a surprise reunion with her host mother from all those decades ago--evidence of the enduring connections Neighbors Abroad endeavors to create across countries and decades.

Enschede

Enschede Delegation Visits Palo Alto; Essay Contest Winners Announced

In late May, Neighbors Abroad welcomed a delegation from Enschede, the



Netherlands, along with a contingent from Enschede's German Sister City, Münster. The three-way, four-day visit focused on sustainability initiatives in and around Palo Alto and brought numerous opportunities for cross-border connections.

Among many other stops on a busy itinerary, the group met with Palo Alto city officials to discuss the city's [Sustainability/Climate Action Plan \(S/CAP\)](#), toured a "smart home," visited Stanford University's [Precourt Institute of Energy](#) and, of course, enjoyed various meals and networking opportunities, including a Mexican-themed evening at the home of Neighbors Abroad President **Bob Wenzlau** and a welcome breakfast at iconic Palo Alto restaurant [Hobee's](#).

A centerpiece of the delegations' time in Palo Alto was the announcement of the winners of the cross-border [Overduin Essay Contest](#), honoring Enschede's Pastor Leendert Overduin, a hero of World War II who quietly saved hundreds of Jewish children and others from the occupying Nazis in and around Enschede.

At an evening reception at Palo Alto's Gamble Garden, local resident **Uri Elzur** spoke poignantly about how Pastor Overduin saved the life of a young girl--who grew up to be Uri's mother--by finding a safehouse for her near Enschede.

Palo Alto **Mayor Pat Burt**, Enschede **Mayor Roelof Bleker**, and Münster **Mayor Markus Lewe** announced the essay contest winners from their respective cities. Master of ceremonies and Neighbors Abroad board member **Edward Fike** announced the winners from our Sibling City, Bloomington, Indiana, some of whom watched the program via livestream. The high schoolers in each city wrote a 500- to 800-word essay about what it means to be a force for good in the world without expectation of recognition. First- and second-place winners from Palo Alto and Bloomington are invited to visit Enschede in summer 2023!

Tsuchiura, Japan

Tsuchiura Honors Longtime Champion of Palo Alto-Tsuchiura Relationship

The Tsuchiura International Association–Neighbors Abroad's counterpart volunteer organization in Tsuchiura, Japan—recently celebrated its 30th anniversary. Palo Alto Mayor Pat Burt, Neighbors Abroad President **Bob Wenzlau**, and Tsuchiura VP **Jennifer Buenrostro** contributed letters congratulating the Association and acknowledging the close connections the groups have forged over the years.

The Association recently honored **Keiko Nakajima** and her husband **Yasuo Kishimoto** with Certificates of Gratitude for their generous donation last year of \$100,000 to help further the Sister City relationship and to expand on the highly successful exchange program between the two cities.

Keiko, a former Palo Alto Unified School District Japanese teacher, has been a driving force behind the Palo Alto-Tsuchiura relationship for more than a decade. She was a founder of the student exchange program and served as Neighbors Abroad's VP for Tsuchiura while she and Yasuo lived in Menlo Park. Yasuo is a retired neuroscience researcher who worked at Johns Hopkins and University of California, San Diego. The couple returned to Japan in 2019. Their \$100,000 donation (reported on in more detail in [the August 2021 edition](#) of *The Dispatch*) is being shared by Neighbors Abroad and the Tsuchiura International Association for the cities' mutually beneficial programs.

With COVID having up-ended exchange programs over the last several years, Japanese teachers at Jordan Middle School and Greene Middle School, along with their counterparts in Tsuchiura, have been valiantly engaging in Zoom "exchanges" between their students, overcoming the hurdles of time zones and masked classrooms. Organizers are looking to relaunch the long-running, in-person exchange program in 2023.

Vidas y Sueños Celebrates Children

Neighbors Abroad's partner organization in Mexico, Vidas y Sueños, has been busy spreading the word about healthy eating to children in communities around Mexico. Almost 1,000 youngsters attended a Children's Festival across eight communities at which they were entertained with puppet shows and other festivities and received donated toys, clothing, and seeds to plant their own gardens. Representatives of Vidas y Sueños also joined the Neighbors Abroad delegation to Oaxaca and visited the community of Yaxe to see how the [donated rainwater capture tanks](#) have changed people's lives in that indigenous area.

Groundbreaking Carbon Offset Program Seeks to Expand

Several years ago, Palo Alto entered into an agreement to purchase carbon offsets from a forestry project within Oaxaca with the goal of offsetting carbon dioxide emissions associated with natural gas use in the Palo Alto community.



This was the first forestry-based carbon offset transaction between the United States and Mexico and Neighbors Abroad played a key role in getting the deal off the ground. Now, the program is poised to expand across our Sister City family. Learn more [here](#).
